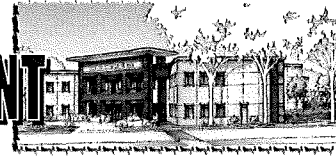

**Police Service Calls**

Department members handled 583 service calls during the month. These calls consist of both citizen requests for police service as described below (512), crimes investigated (43), traffic accidents investigated (18), and Wisconsin Probation and Parole Assists (10).

A.	Traffic and Road Incidents.....	59
	This category consists of all assignments involving assists to stranded motorists, directing traffic, complaints of noisy or otherwise disorderly vehicles, removing obstructions from roadways, and all parking problem complaints.	
B.	Noise Complaints.....	02
	These complaints involve private parties, licensed liquor establishments, and parties in public places.	
C.	Sick and Injured Persons.....	14
	Assistance rendered to the Ambulance Service and sick or injured persons.	
D.	Alarms.....	17
	Officers responded to activated burglar and hold-up alarms at area banks and other business establishments and residences as well as fire alarms.	
E.	Complaints Involving Animals.....	17
	Investigations by officers of noisy animals, loose animals, animal bites, wild animals and sick, injured or dead animal complaints.	
F.	Civil Disputes.....	04
	Arguments between neighbors, landlords and tenants, and family members where no crimes have been committed.	
G.	Escorts.....	07
	Transporting citizens, money escorts for area financial institutions, funerals, and for area industry and farming.	
H.	Citizen Assist .....	44
	This category is broad and involves such services as assistance in gas drive-off, emergency notifications, attempts to locate people, retrieval of personal property, and vehicle registration assistance.	

I. Assistance Rendered to Other Agencies.....	06
Includes assistance to other law enforcement and government agencies.	
J. Suspicious Person / Vehicle / Circumstance .....	21
Involves both citizen complaints and observations by officers on patrol who took investigative action in regard to the suspicious behavior of vehicles and people.	
K. Self-Initiated Field Activity.....	01
All initiated activity by the officer to include, but not limited to, routine security checks of area industries, businesses, city parks, residences, and compliance checks of local liquor establishments.	
L. Juvenile Problems .....	02
Requests for police service that strictly involve property calls and all unfounded calls for police service. The calls vary from mischief to family problems to runaway situations.	
M. Miscellaneous Incidents.....	292
Includes arrest warrants served, recovered property calls, unfounded calls for police service, minor calls for police service, and 9-1-1 calls investigated.	
N. Welfare Checks.....	26
Includes calls to check on the well-being of a person who has not been heard from or seen for a period of time by family, friends, neighbors, or employers.


**Department Training**
